Helping farm families, regardless of income

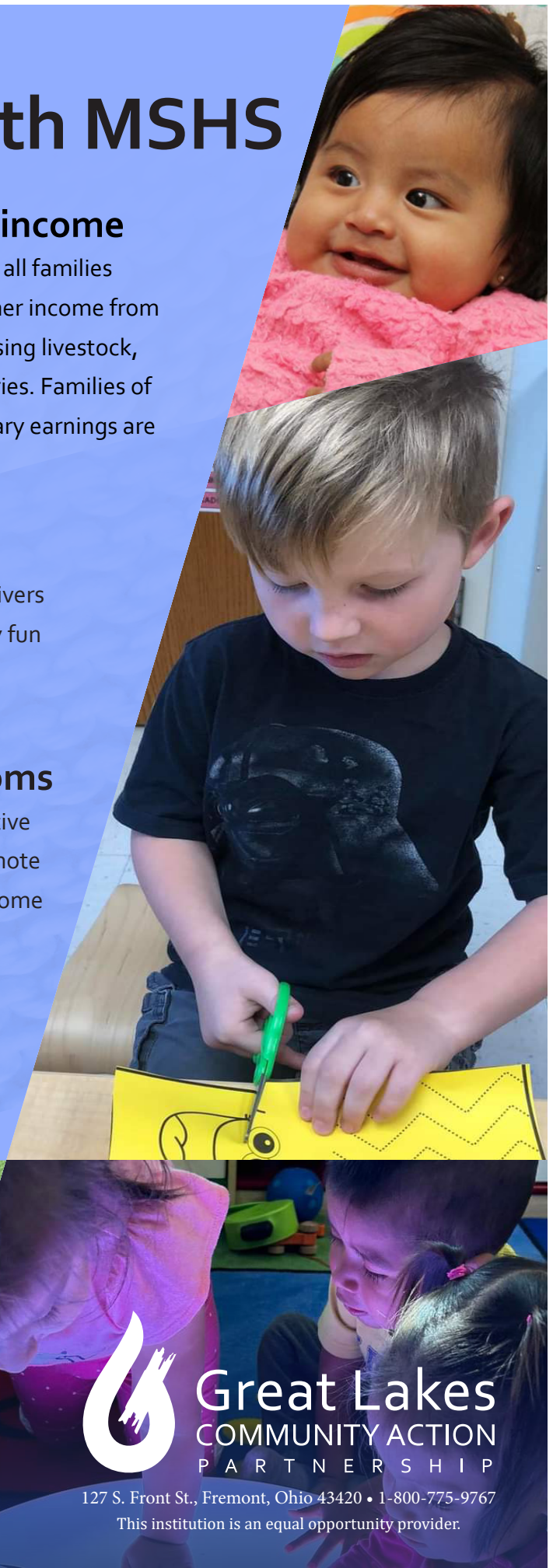
Migrant & Seasonal Head Start (MSHS) services are open to all families with at least one member who earns 50% or more of his or her income from an agricultural profession. This could include harvesting, raising livestock, processing, beekeeping, or other agriculture-related industries. Families of all income levels are eligible, so long as one member's primary earnings are from agriculture work.

Providing family-oriented programs

MSHS classrooms offer opportunities for parents and caregivers to participate and engage in the classroom, including family fun nights, parent cafés, leadership roles and more.
