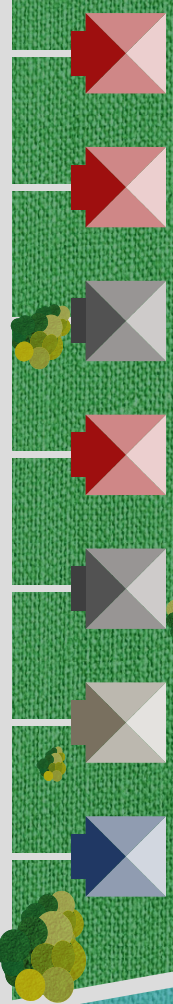

Transitional and long-term aid

SERVICE AREA:

Housing support services are available in Erie, Huron, Ottawa, Richland, Sandusky, Seneca, and Wood counties.

RAPID REHOUSING:

Provides time-limited rental assistance and services to clients who are homeless with goals to move clients into housing quickly and increase self-sufficiency.

PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Provides long-term housing assistance and case management for participants who are homeless and have at least one family member with a verified disability and are able to live independently.

GUIDELINES:

Housing units must meet program requirements and the landlord must be willing to work with GLCAP. Participants may be asked to pay a portion of their income towards rent.



Veteran-specific services

SERVICE AREA:

Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) housing support is offered in Erie, Hancock, Huron, Lorain, Lucas, Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca, Wood, and Wyandot counties.

GUIDELINES:

SSVF serves veterans who are homeless or facing homelessness and are at 80% or below of the county's median income. Housing units must meet program requirements and the landlord must be willing to work with GLCAP.

ASSISTANCE OPTIONS:

May provide help with past-due rent, first month's rent and/or security deposit, and utility assistance and/or deposits (if related to a housing crisis). SSVF will also assist clients with case

HUD Guidelines

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines consider persons to be homeless if they are living in an emergency shelter, motel paid for by a charitable organization, tent or campground, or a place not meant to be lived in such as a car, park, or abandoned building.
